

In 2021, IEDC celebrated the creation of Innovate 218, a regional Launch Minnesota Hub program designed to support innovators and entrepreneurs located in northeast Minnesota. Amanda Lamppa joined our team to oversee several Innovate 218 initiatives, including ILT Academy Workshops, The RINK Pitch Competition and developing a new website.

Innovate 218 is a "Ground Up Initiative" where - thanks to our partners - we put plans to action and delivered exceptional results for our first year. 2022 promises to bring more opportunities for local entrepreneurs to engage, grow confidence and thrive.

Launch Minnesota, a Minnesota DEED initiative, connects every corner of the state with a first-of-its-kind hub and spoke model. The Launch Network currently includes six regions, eight hubs and over 80 program partners.



IEDC, along with partners from Itasca Community College and the Northeast Office of Job Training, raised \$1.1M to renovate our existing Airport Road Building into The Forge.


THINGS CHANGE IN A FORGE.

The Forge will be a home to people of all demographics, students and teachers, innovators and entrepreneurs, and community members ready to learn a new skill. It's a makerspace, a training ground, a shop and a classroom rolled into one - and it's for everyone.

Phase 1 is funded and work is in progress. Phases 2 and 3 are in the planning and fundraising stages.

IEDC's Small Business Development Center (SBDC) is a core component of the work we do in Itasca County, serving over 200 clients every year. New registrations, clients who have not received services from the SBDC before, have risen significantly from an average of 24 in 2019 to 61 in 2020 and 92 in 2021.

The SBDC works with entrepreneurs at every level. Marketing, human resources, e-commerce, and capital improvement have become more necessary, and impact all sectors allowing for more in-depth work with clients. In adapting to these new demands for services, IEDC's SBDC consultants have a network of resources and work diligently to assist each individual client.



Looking back, 2021 was a year of rethinking and redevelopment. APEX is proud of the accomplishments achieved in partnership with IEDC. APEX and IEDC remain closely aligned on many strategic goals and work collaboratively on many initiatives to strengthen economic development in and around Itasca County.

This year, APEX contributed to 6 milestone projects, completed 8 Request for Information (RFI) submissions on behalf of Itasca properties and conducted 16 Business Retention & Expansion (BR&E) visits with growing companies around the county. Additionally, APEX's work generated 17 new business attraction leads within Itasca County and the team attended 8 tradeshows and conferences, bringing back valuable insight to promote economic development within Itasca County.

2021 was a record-breaking year for the Entrepreneur Fund (EF) in terms of clients served and loans closed. EF provided business advising and training to over 1,900 entrepreneurs last year, partnered with over 1,050 local small businesses, and closed more than 700 loans for a total of \$27.8 million. Lending in the first half of 2021 was heavily focused on COVID-19 relief, with EF playing an important role in Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) lending.

133 entrepreneurs representing 111 small businesses received business advising or training from the Entrepreneur Fund.


Pandemic Partnership

Itasca Small Business Relief Fund

The Entrepreneur Fund partnered with IEDC to manage their Itasca Small Business Relief Fund. Through 2020 and 2021 the Fund resulted in 48 loans totaling \$894,000 made to provide relief to and preserve small businesses that make up the vitality of Itasca County.
